Classes

1. Short history of Latin language. Alphabet. Vowels. Consonants. Diphthongs. Pronunciation in Latin. Accent. Reading of medical terms.
2. The Verb. General information. Conjugation: I, II, III, IV. *Infinitivus, indicativus, imperativus praesentis activi*. Translation of the Latin sentences and proverbs.
3. Short test of conjugation. Declension - general information. Nouns of the first declension. Greek nouns of the first declension. Exceptions of masculine gender. Vocabulary. Practical exercises.
4. Second declension (masculine and neuter nouns). Exceptions. Vocabulary. Greek-Latin equivalents.
5. Adjectives of the first and second declension. Vocabulary. Agreement with nouns. Practical exercises.
6. Third declension. General information. Three types of nouns. Masculine gender - type of consonant.
7. Third declension - feminine nouns. Exceptions of masculine and neuter gender. The formation of the terms of the inflammatory. Practical exercises.
8. Third declension - neuter nouns. Exceptions. Type of vowels.
9. Third declension - irregular nouns. Greek nouns ending in 'sis' and the words like *febris* etc.
10. Adjectives of the third declension. Vocabulary. Comparison of Latin adjectives.
11. Fourth declension of nouns. Exceptions. Vocabulary.
12. Nouns of the fifth declension. Vocabulary.
13. The most important prepositions connected with *Accusativus* and *Ablativus*. Practical exercises. Latin and Greek prefixes in medical terminology.
14. General expressions in medical diagnosis. Translation of diagnoses.
